Q At the Ambassador, huh?

A Yes, Banquets Department.

Q 315?

Q Okay, Karl, I'm Sgt. McGann from Homicide, downtown. My partner, Sgt. Calkins. Could you tell us what you saw and what you did tonight?

A Yeah. I took Senator Kennedy off the stage and he was supposed to go through the kitchen, through the pantry behind it, (*) wall.

Q What you are talking about, this area--Embassy Room, over here and this being the hallway, hallway leading down to the Colonial Room, which would be the working press room, I think, as it was described--

A There's a stage here, and through here (*) on my hands 'cause the crowd was very--I think it was very busy there. Everybody was (*). I had it on my hands, still going to shake hands with somebody and he grabbed his hand again and we went straight ahead until he got about beginning of the heaters. This is pantry here.

Q Uh huh (yes).

A And heaters we keep the plates hot, food hot, and right in the beginning, somewhere here, that guy, he must have jumped—he must have bent down and jumped up and start shooting. First shot—first shot or second shot must have been shortly one after another, you know, and I saw

Mr. Kennedy falling down out of my hand (*) and he is still shooting. And then I hit his hand down and I don't know how many times he shot. I don't know. I couldn't even tell you--four times, five times, six times, it was--but he was shooting another direction, I think, but it was trying to push the gun away from the crowd into the kitchen. And then some other guys came somewhere, either same side or front, took the gun away from him.

Q But--

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A I kept him for about seven-between seven or ten minutes, my arm, like. That's all I can tell you, until the police came in. They asked me to listen and came over to the police.

Q Was there a crowd, employees, in the building, standing in this little area that apparently leads from another hallway down to where the pantry area is?

A I don't know. Would be, I imagine, though that the people were standing, from the kitchen, standing around this area 'cause I saw him shaking hands with one of' the dishwashers.

Q Uh huh (eys).

A I know that, and then he came back and I grabbed his hand again and pulled him through, through the crowd.

Q This is the Senator's hand you grabbed?

A Yes, I grabbed his hand again and then at the time that it happened.

Q Where was this guy that had the gun the first time you saw him?

A The first time I saw him, he was--I was coming this way. He was standing on my left hand, coming this way and about--about here, around here; this area here.

Q He was very close to you, then, the first time you saw him?

A Right in front of me, right in front of me, you know. He must have come up from the bottom, because I don't--I didn't see him in front of me. I saw all the people in front of me. He must have come up. I think he must have covered the gun with something, paper or something, 'cause the first I didn't see no gun; then I saw something white, either paper or something, and I heard a shot. Later said I thought it was a fire cracker, you know. I didn't even realize at the first shot that it was a gun but by the second shot, I turned around and saw Kennedy falling down out of my hand and then at the time that I realized it must have been a gun, then I grabbed him, you know.

Q Did he sort of reach around you to shoot the Senator?

A Yeah.

Q He rmort of reached around you to shoot the Senator or did he get past you or --

A Yes, I think he was right in front of me because the way he-he was right in front of me, right in front. He

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turned around and shot with his right hand.

- Q He had the gun in his right hand?
- A In his right hand, yeah, because I kept him in my right hand and he was--yes, in his right hand. He was trying to pull the right hand over again. I was trying to move that hand over.
- Q He was trying to get the gun back to where he could shoot people?
 - A Right.

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- Q And you were trying to prevent this?
- A Right.
- Q Did you see the gun?
- A I saw the gun, yeah. Yeah.
- Q All right. Let me show a gun, and you tell me if this appears to be a gun similar to the one you saw?
- A I tell you the truth, I don't think it was that big, but could be. I really don't--
 - Q You're not sure?
- A No, I'm not sure because I didn't pay too much attention to the gun. See, I was trying to hit him hand away and was trying to hold him.
 - Q Uh huh (yes). Uh huh (yes).
- A Uh huh (yes), and he was trying to get away from me and I was afraid if I let him loose, that he's going to shoot me in the (*)--in my stomach, you know.
 - Q Uh huh (yes). Did he say anything to you? Do

you recall did he --

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- A No.
- Q Did you hear him say anything at all?
- A No, just when (*) very tight and he was making noise and somebody else was talking, but it was about two or three minutes afterward, was talking over my back and I think it was time to hit him and I told them, "Don't hit him," and he was talking to him and he says something. I don't know what he said.
 - Q Could you --
 - A I was so excited.
- Q I could understand that. Could you describe this man?
 - A The man standing behind me?
 - Q The man who did the shooting?
 - A Oh, yes. Oh, yes. He was smaller than me.
 - Q He was a :male--
 - A Dark head--dark hair.
 - Q Dark hair?
 - A Dark hair.
 - Q How old would you think he was?
- A I think--I wouldn't think he was more than 24 years old.
 - Q Uh huh (yes).
 - A Maybe less than that.
 - Q What nationality do you think he was?

I--I think he was--I couldn't tell you. He A never opened the mouth. He never talked, so he never had any accent I could tell; but he could easily be a Mexican or Puerto Rican. Q Latin descent? Latin descent, yeah. A Would you know him if you saw him again? Q I would say yes. Yes. Yes. What color hair do you say and how was it --Q Dark. Dark hair, and would you describe 1t? Q Slightly backwards, combed slightly, but a little backwards. Was it normally normal or long or short? Yeah, He didn't have this long hair, no, I don'the didn't have that. Uh huh (yes). Q What was he wearing; do you remember? As a matter of fact, I thought it was one of our banquet housemen because he had a blue suit on, a dark auit on. You mean a work suit or --Q Work suit, dark. I think it was blue. Uh huh (yes). Q The first idea I had, I thought it was one of the busboys, one of the housemen.

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Q Uh huh (yes).

A When I looked at the face, I didn't recognize him.

- Q You had never seen him before--
- A No.
- Q --as far as you know, anyway? Now, you say when you first saw him, he was more or less appeared in front of you?

A Right here, and we struggle about--until we get about right over here somewhere in the middle, middle of it, cause I pulled him away and I--

- Q Was he still firing?
- A He was still firing, yeah. Oh, yeah. Like I said, I don't know how many shots he shot, but I was trying to get his gun away and his arm away and hi was pulling him on the side; so I don't know how many feet. I think we got almost to the middle of the heaters, approximately.
- Q Did you ever look back and see the Senator or any other persons down, apparently wounded?
- A I saw Kennedy laying down and saw blood coming somewhere from his head, but I was holding him and people came following me. Afterward I saw somebody else laying almost close to him, next to him.
- Now, you say you looked down and you saw other persons standing down in this area, right?
 - A Right, there were people in front of me when I

came out.

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Q In other words, when you left the Embassy Room--

A Yes.

Q -- and cleared these doors here and passed where the employees were standing--

A Uh huh (yes).

Q --you looked down the hallway and you saw other people standing--

A I saw them; not too many, but I don't know--six, seven, eight people. I don't know.

Q Did you recognize anyone standing down here?

A Huh hu (no).

Q Not a soul. In other words, do you think they were the employees at the hotel or news people or just bystanders?

A I think bystanders. Maybe one of them newsmen.

I don't know. Really, I don't know.

Q Do you--

A Course, at the time I got to him, I didn't pay no attention to anybody left or right except the guy that standing behind me was talking to--the colored guy; he was there.

Q Mr. Johnson?

Q Mr. Johnson.

Q Refer Johnson?

A Mr. Johnson, yeah. He was talking to him. Then

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I saw somebody else hitting him on the head and then I looked backwards and saw somebody else laying there; but that's all I know--he had the gun in his hand and I was trying--

Q Did you ever get any indication that there was anybody in that area that was helping this man with the gun, that was a friend of his or anything?

A No. No. No.

Q Nothing?

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A No, not at all.

Q Did you notice any--any-any male Latins, what you could describe as male Latins dressed similar or dressed not in normal business suit or sports coat and slacks and tie--

A No.

Q No one else?

A I didn't see anybody, but could have been.

I don't know. I don't remember.

Q You didn't see anybody, as far as you remember, anyway?

A No.

Q Fine. You had the Senator by the left hand, did you say?

A Yeah.

Q Your left hand and his left--

A (*) He let it go one time and he was shaking

hands with somebody just shortly before and I got his hand 1 again, was trying to pull him through the crowd, get him may from there. Were you on the right side of him? On the right side of him, yes, but it was close to the heaters, you know. 8 Uh huh (yes). Right along--when you say "heaters, 7 you mean the steam tables? 8 Yeah, I was in front of him just like this. I A was holding him hand just like this. 10 And he had stopped to shake hands with somebody? 11 Shake hands with somebody, stopped, and I 12 got this hand again and was trying to pull him. 13 The was more or less right in front of him, Q 14 pulling him sideways? 15 Right. 16 He stopped to talk to a dishwasher, is that right, 17 or to make hands with a dishwasher? 18 Yes, he shaked hands with one of the -- I think it 19 was one of the dishwashers (*) get ahold of him again. 20 Son of a gun. 21 Did it happen in the fight? 3 22 It was close, you know. 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Witness SANDRA SERRANO at the Ambassador Hotel went thru her actions for reporting officers FBI agent BURRIS, SECRET SERVICE agent SHERMAN. She stated that she was sitting on the rear steps (which lead from the s/w corner of ENBASSY ROOM) getting some fresh air. Two men and a woman came up the stairs and the woman stated "excuse us please". Twenty to twenty-five (20-25) minutes later she heard what sounded like six quick back fires, and about 30 seconds later the same woman (Polka Dot Dress) and the taller of the two men came down the stairway. The woman was running shead of the man and said "we shot him, we shot him". The witness asked "you shot who"? and the woman replied Senator Kennedy. The wines then went into the hallway of the Ambassador Room and saw a uniforme security and asked "did they shoot Senator Kennedy" and he stated "y it drunk". The witness then confronted a group of people and asked then the same question. They replied your crazy". The witness then went into the Sunset Room, back thru the Ambassador Ante Room into the hallway to a phone booth, she then called her mother in Lorraine, Ohio telling her that Senator Fennedy was shot. The phone used by the witness was one of five booths. She pointed out two booths, of which one was the one she used. Phone numbers 3860824, 3869837. Descriptions of suspents some as given by witness on original interview. There was no guard in duty at the Embassy Room south rear door at time of shooting or prior to shooting.
